WASTE MANAGEMENT BYE LAWS 2003 (No. 1)

BYELAWS FOR THE REGULATION OF USE OF BRING FACILITIES IN LONGFORD

(Adopted by Longford County Council on 20th October, 2003)

Pursuant to Section 37 of the Local Government Act 1994 & Section 35 of the Waste Management Act, 1996, Longford County Council have made this Bye-Law to regulate the use of Bring Facilities within its functional area.

Definitions

Bring facility means a facility at which segregated wastes may be deposited by the public in appropriate purpose-built receptacles for the purposes of recovery. *As defined in the Waste Management (Collection Permit) Regulations 2001.*

Household waste means waste produced within the curtilage of a building or self contained part of a building used for the purposes of living accommodation. *As defined in the Waste Management Act 1996.*

Recovery, in relation to waste, means any activity carried on for the purposes of reclaiming, recycling or reusing, in whole or in part, the waste and any activities related to such reclamation, recycling or reuse, including any of the activities specified in the Fourth Schedule of the Waste Management Act 1996. *As defined in the Waste Management Act 1996.*

Vicinity for the purposes of the Waste Management Bye Laws 2003 (No. 1) includes the area on or around the base of the bring facility on which the receptacles are placed including an area within a radius of 100m from any such receptacle.

Use of Bring Facilities

- 1.1 A Bring Facility shall not be used to deposit wastes other than segregated wastes for which appropriate purpose-built receptacles have been provided.
- 1.2 A Bring Facility shall only be used to deposit household waste.
- 1.3 Any person using a bring facility must deposit waste into the appropriate purpose built receptacles.
- 1.4 Wastes, including waste for which appropriate purpose-built receptacles have been provided, shall not be deposited in the vicinity of a Bring Facility.

Penalties

Pursuant to Section 40 of the Local Government Act 1994 a person who contravenes a provision of a Bye-Law shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding €1,270.
