Comhairle na nÓg

Longford Comhairle na nÓg is continuing to collect plastic bottles in partnership with secondary schools to create a recycled HOPE (Helping Our Planet's Environment) bench. The bench will be made of 5,000 colourful plastic recycled bottles and will be wheelchair accessible.

This first HOPE Bench will be located along the Longford Canal Walk with the official unveiling set for early spring. Due to the project's popularity, a plan is being put in place to create more benches for other parts of the county.

Over 2,700 visits have been recorded to the library over the first four weeks of its operation, with 2,000 items borrowed from the library's shelves.


The encouraging and steady flow of customers includes many students and families. There are also many adults visiting to use the fast broadband, wifi and printing facilities on offer to help them work remotely. All customers are being encouraged to use the self-service machines and this is working very well.

The library also hosted its first successful art exhibition opening on Friday, 17 December by Edgeworthstown artist Ciara Tuite (pictured with her family above). This exhibition runs until Monday, 31 January. Longford Age Friendly Programme Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic the Longford Age Friendly Programme focused strongly on supporting our older citizens' mental health and wellbeing, and keeping them connected.

Aligned to this focus, photojournalist Brian Farrell interviewed and photographed 30 older Longford people from the three municipal districts. This work resulted in a book entitled 'Longford Memories: Reflections in a Time of Pandemic' which was launched in December. Funded through Creative Ireland, this book is proving to be a huge succes and has been been sent to Longford people all over the world. The book is now in its second print run.



Heritage

Under the Community Monuments Fund, community archaeological conservation management plans have been advanced for key archaeological sites. This includes the repair of the Tower House at Abbeyshrule Abbey. Additional funding of €15,000 was secured to continue masonry works at this site in December.

Beyond 2022 Project

As part of the Beyond 2022 Project, images of the manuscript County Longford Grand Jury Books (1759-1907) have now been digitised and are being prepared for online release. This will recreate, virtually, the Public Record Office of Ireland, which was destroyed in 1922.

Decade of Centenaries

The Decade of Centenaries programme has been very successful and funding has been approved to continue the programme into 2022. A number of projects have been identified, including the centenary of the setting up of An Garda Síochána.

Longford Live & Local winter

programme got underway

Longford Live & Local continued with phase two bringing a winter programme into winter and the festive season. Longford County Council was awarded a further grant of €143,000 to engage local artists, musicians and creative communities to deliver performances and cultural events.

Coordinated by Creative Ireland Longford, Longford Live & Local ran with the support of local events manager Shane Crossan and his company Republic of Culture. Many events were based around the switching on of the Christmas lights in our towns and villages. All events strictly observed public health guidelines. Particularly successful were the arts and crafts fairs in Longford and Ballymahon and the art exhibitions held in Longford, Edgeworthstown and Ballymahon. All showcased the work of locally-based or locallylinked professional artists and craftspeople.



A special event in Backstage Theatre to celebrate the success of traditional musician Angelina Carberry (winner of TG4 Ceoltoir na Blian 2021) was due to take place on 8 January. This has since been deferred to a later date, due to rising case numbers.

Local Sports Partnership

Sports First Aid Course

Sports First Aid Course, the Longford Sports Partnership programme for volunteer and coach training, continued in December in St Mel's College.

As part of this course, coaches and volunteers received information and instruction on how to manage common sports-specific injuries and accidents that can occur during sports training and events.

Participants also practiced CPR and defibrillator, as well as receiving training on concussion, fractures and brakes, dislocations, asthma, winding, choking, bleeding and bandages, spinal injuries, respiratory emergences, and sprains and strains.

This course is advisable for anybody who is involved or participates in sport including coaches, parents, teachers, and physical activity leaders.

Longford County Council Sports Bursary

Longford County Council, in collaboration with the Longford Sports Partnership, announced the Longford County Council Sports Bursary in December.

This award facilitates achievement by aspiring individual performers who have the ability and potential to gain recognition and success at national and international level. Longford County Council allocated €5,000 towards this bursary.

Safeguarding - Good Practices for Children's Sport

Longford Sports Partnership held three safeguarding training courses for coaches and volunteers in the month of December: Safeguarding One Training, Safeguarding Two Training, and Safeguarding Three Training.

Safeguarding One Training is for all volunteers, coaches, children's officers and designated liaison persons involved in any capacity with children in sport. This course educates participants on the implementation of best practice in protecting the welfare of children involved in sport. Certification is awarded by Sport Ireland.

Safeguarding Two Training is for club children's officers whose primary aim is the establishment of a child centred ethos within their club.

Safeguarding Three Training is for any persons appointed to the designated liaison person position in a club. The designated liaison person is responsible for reporting allegations or suspicions of child abuse to the relevant authorities.

Primary School Exercise and Fitness Programme

Starting in December, the Primary School Exercise and Fitness Programme is a new Longford Sports Partnership initiative for promoting exercise and fitness for Longford's primary schools.

The programme focuses on fundamental movement using games and fun activities designed for the different age groups in primary school. This programme will continue into 2022.

Designed to help businesses prepare for the adoption of digital tools and techniques, consultancy support of €4,500 will be available for eligible micro-enterprise.

Streetscape Enhancement Measure

The Streetscape Enhancement Measure continued into December, making a big difference to the visual appearance of the towns involved. In particular, Longford Town's traders made many physical and cosmetic improvements to the fronts of their buildings.





River Walk in Aughnacliffe

A 600m trail at the Aughnacliffe River Walk has been completed. Linking to a previously developed trail, this development now includes a walkway and viewing platform to Pulliness Waterfall.

Running along the Rathmore River, the trail now creates a looped walk within the village and builds upon the work of the community to make this hidden gem more accessible.

This new trail enhances the amenity by linking to wider trails which lead to the area's dolmens and the site of the ancient village.

The project highlights the Council collaboration with the local community who have driven this project for the betterment of the village's tourism offerings.

Unfinished Estates

Much progress has been made throughout 2021 to address the issues associated with unfinished housing developments. The majority of the unfinished estates have now been taken in charge by Longford County Council.

The Unfinished Estates team continues its work to ensure all estates are of a sufficient standard to ensure enhanced quality of life for residents.

There were originally 128 unfinished estates within the county. As of December 2021, there are seven sites remaining to be taken over by the Council. The Unfinished Estates team has negotiated Site Resolution Plans for these remaining estates and work will continue on these in 2022.

Rural Regeneration and Development Fund

Applications were invited for the fourth call of the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund (RRDF) by the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD on 17 December.

This fund provides investment support towards suitable projects for towns and villages (and their outlying areas) with a population of less than 10,000.

The RRDF delivers on the national strategic objective of strengthened rural economies and communities and to achieve sustainable economic and social development in these areas.


Projects that will be funded under the RRDF are those that have full planning and other consents in place and are ready to commence at the date of application. The projects put forward will rejuvenate town centres, boost economic growth and footfall and make our rural towns and villages more attractive places to live, work or raise a family. There is also a strong focus on projects that involve transforming old or derelict buildings into remote working hubs and libraries, as well as e-learning, cultural, enterprise, youth and community spaces.

The Regeneration team is currently working on project proposals for funding applications under this scheme.

Mid-Shannon Wilderness Park Greenway

Work continued on the construction of the Mid-Shannon Wilderness Park Greenway. This greenway will utilise Bord na Móna land that is no longer used for peat production, repurposing this land to provide a recreational and tourism amenity.

Work in 2021 builds on previous trails developed around Corlea Trackway Centre and the surrounding bogland. It also creates a larger loop which links back into the Royal Canal Greenway. This key piece of tourism infrastructure in County Longford will ultimately link the Royal Canal Greenway at Clondra with Lanesborough.

Housing

Regional Homelessness Action Plan In December, local authorities were notified that the Regional Homelessness Action Plan must be revised. This plan, orginally adopted in 2010, has previously been reviewed at different stages across the nine regions with responsibility for the management of homelessness.

Within this review, the regional lead authorities for homelessness must incorporate and reflect the policy positions and actions contained in the Government's Housing For All policy. The lead authorities will be supported by the regional statutory management group and Homelessness Consultative Forum. There will also be input from the local authorities in each region.

The process to revise and amend the existing plan for the Midlands will be undertaken by Westmeath County Council, as the regional homelessness lead with input from Longford, Offaly and Laois County Councils.

Housing Delivery Action Plans

Under the Government's Housing For All policy, local authorities must develop and submit housing delivery action plans with details of social and affordable housing delivery.

Longford County Council's Action Plan was submitted to the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government in mid-December. Consistent with the Council's adopted Development Plan and associated environmental assessments, the plan sets out details of social and affordable housing delivery from 2022-2026, in line with targets set under Housing For All.

2021 Void Programme

The 2021 Voids Programme has now concluded. Longford County Council received funding of €639,000 for 25 properties. Two refurbishment options were available: the standard refurbishment and the non-standard voids.

The standard refurbishment was a fast-tracked programme with maximum funding of €11,000 per property. For the non-standard voids, the maximum was €50,000 per property recognising the significant investment required to bring them up to compliance with minimum letting standards.

Roads

Allocation for National Roads and Greenways 2022

December saw the announcement of the 2022 Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII) Allocations for National Roads and Greenways, with €8,203,790 allocated to Longford County Council.

Within the allocation to roads, over €7 million is for improvement projects on the N4, N55 and N63, with over €400,000 for national primary and secondary road maintenance, including route lighting and winter maintenance.

In September, TII became the approving authority for greenways. A separate allocation of €750,000 is now available for two greenway schemes in Longford. These are: the Mid Shannon Wilderness Corlea Bog Greenway, with an allocation of €600,000, and the Kilnacarrow Bridge - Darogue and Ballymacormack Greenway with an allocation of €150,000.

Longford County Council have been informed by Westmeath National Roads Office that TII have not provided any allocation for the N4 Mullingar to Longford (Roosky) Scheme.

This scheme is currently at phase two 'options selection' stage. The emerging preferred route corridor is due to be identified in the next few months. Work on this hugely important road scheme will be suspended unless an allocation is provided.

Municipal District Works

Works on footpaths, drainage, pothole repair and general road maintenance continued in each municipal district during the month.

Road Safety

The Government's new ten-year road safety strategy 'Our Journey Towards Vision Zero: Ireland's Government Road Safety Strategy 2021–2030' was launched mid-December by Minister Hildegarde Naughton. This strategy aims to reduce deaths and serious injuries on Irish roads by 50 per cent by 2030, towards ultimately eliminating all road deaths and serious injuries on Irish roads by 2050.



The new strategy will be delivered in three phases. Phase one runs from 2021 to 2024. It is backed by a projected €3.8 billion investment and includes 50 high-impact actions and 136 support actions.

The strategy builds on the progress made with the previous road safety strategy, which saw Ireland achieve the lowest number of annual road deaths since records began. Ireland also achieved the second lowest rate of road deaths in the European Union in 2019.

The Longford Road Safety Working Together Committee will develop a new Longford Road Safety Plan in accordance with phase one of this new national road safety strategy.

National Road Schemes

Works on the N63 Majors Well Road continued with the installation of underground services. Resurfacing work on the N4 at Newtownforbes also continued in December.

Water Services

Find & Fix Programme

Longford County Council Find & Fix team are operating in the Prucklish, Clooncoose and Clonbalt District Metered Areas (DMAs), with a saving of approximately 144,000 litres of drinking water per day.

Capital Network Schemes

Water Services Capital section continue to liaise with Irish Water to progress three capital network rehabilitation schemes:

- Cahanagh-Prucklish: replacement of problematic watermain between Cahanagh Cross and Prucklish (along the R198). This project has been substantially completed and the new watermain has been commissioned.
- Rathcline Road, Lanesborough: replacement of approximately 2.5km of problematic watermain between Lanesborough and Carrowroe reservoir. Phase one of this project has commenced with new watermain laid
- Creevy, Granard: replacement of approximately 500 metres of problematic watermain

Longford to Lanesborough Network

Water Services Capital Section continue to liaise with Irish Water to deliver network upgrades to enable water supply from Longford Central Supply Zone to the Lanesborough Supply Zone.

This work will improve the resilience of the water network and provide security of supply to the Lanesborough area.

Planning

Applications and Enforcement

Planning continues to assist the public with planning projects, applications and dealing with queries and planning issues for developments in the county. Planning also assists across various Council services, including the implementation of the housing, regeneration, environment and infrastructural programmes.

The statutory requirements are broad and include managing various applications for housing, retail, amenity, industrial, compulsory purchase orders, and enforcement among others. The planning office, public counter and technical advice including planning enforcement have remained fully functioning throughout the pandemic.

County Development Plan

Longford County Development Plan 2021-2027 came into effect in November and is now the official development plan for County Longford.

The policies and strategies of the Plan are currently being implemented. The basic draft has been published and work is ongoing in relation to publishing the final document.

Work now has started on the review of the Longford Town Plan, to include:

Environment

Energy Reduction

Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) confirmed that the Council surpassed the Government-set target to reduce energy usage by 33% by the end of 2020.

Energy efficiency upgrades to Council buildings and public lighting allowed the Council to achieve this. Continued improvements are planned to help the Council reach the new 50% reduction for energy use and 50% carbon emissions reduction targets by 2030.

Christmas Recycling Campaign

Throughout December, the Council promoted its Christmas recycling campaign to encourage recycling in many different ways.

As part of this, all e-waste and batteries should be brought to the nearest civic amenity site or local retail shop to be recycled.

Climate Action Initiatives

Libraries

With grant funding of €100,000 from the Department of Rural and Community Development, a programme of works was completed to improve energy efficiency through our branch library network. Works include upgrading lighting, heating, replacing windows and carrying out essential repairs to make our buildings more energy efficient.

Regeneration

- Development of walkway through Mid Shannon Wilderness Park and at the River Walk, Aughnacliffe to encourage people to get out into nature to walk or cycle and to reduce the use of motorised vehicles.
- Procurement and installation of additional LED energy saving lighting at Ballinalee Forest Walk.

Information Technology

- Several paperless projects are progressing. The eCorporate Service Planning app and the ePMDS app are both now live. Each app will see a significant reduction in paper, printing, and energy usage per employee.
- IT has completed work with the Community and Enterprise section on a paperless community grants applications process.

Housing

 As part of the Midlands Retrofit Programme, work is ongoing on the retrofitting of four Council estates in Ballinalee – River Crescent and Camlin View are now completed, while Cois na hAbhainn and Hill View are ongoing.

- Tender is in progress for St Matthew's Park, Ballymahon and an assessment of works required is being considered for the 46 local authority houses in the county.
- Under the National Energy Efficiency Programme work has been completed on four houses in Slí na Móna, Ballymahon while work has commenced on the 16 others.

Roads

Longford County Council has applied for funding to the Department of Transport for five road schemes under the Climate Change Adaption and Resilience Works 2022. The grant allocation will be notified to the Council in February 2022.

Planning

- Climate adaptation actions are being prepared. This will include work on renaturing of bogs, woodland, amenity areas, walkways and cycleways. It will be critically important to work positively with all sectors of Longford society, particularly the agricultural sector, to achieve positive outcomes for all.
- A preliminary list of actions is being prepared, including the implementation of the Lough Ree UNESCO Biosphere proposal.

Fire Services

The Midland Energy Agency has completed an audit on Longford Fire Station and the new extension.

Civil Defence

Reusable cups were purchased for all volunteers to eliminate the use of paper cups.
